THE COMPOSER

Georges Bizet was born in Paris, Oct. 25, 1838, and died at Bougival, June 3, 1875, before his thirty-seventh birthday. He entered the Conservatoire about 1847, studying the piano under Marmontel, and composition under Halevy, whose daughter he subsequently married. He was awarded the Prix de Rome in 1857. After his study in Rome a long succession of failures followed, but the incidental music to Daudet's L'Arlésienne turned the tide of popular favor. In 1875 the Opera Carmen, text by his father-in-law and Meilhac, was produced at the Opera Comique, and was received with indifference. As is well known, this work eventually became standard in the operatic repertory. This opera and the L'Arlésienne music, which Bizet arranged as two suites for orchestra, are the works upon which his fame chiefly rests.

PROGRAM NOTE

L'Arlésienne suites were originally conceived as incidental music to Daudet's work of the same name, were subsequently arranged in their present form by the composer, and have since been subjected to all manner of rearrangement and reinstrumentation. The Pastorale (I from the Second Suite) is rather more brilliant and complex than the usual style for a movement bearing that title. The Intermezzo (II from the same Suite), more conventional in form, is a lyric melody preceded by a brilliant introduction developed from motives selected from the main theme. It rises to a considerable climax and closes with a coda based on the introduction.
